
Tyre Awareness


At our last meeting, Leigh Booth, spoke on the need to regularly check the condition of your tyres. In his illustrated talk, he showed examples of accidents, some fatal, caused by tyre failure.


The main points he emphasised were:


- Rotate all five tyres at each service
- Look for signs of stress fine cracks in side walls and tread not in a straight line. Replace the tyre if present.
- Temporary tyre repairs are just that. Get fixed as soon as possible.
- Check the age of your tyres, particularly those over five years. The date of manufacture can be found on the wall of a tyre in a MMYY format, e.g. 0622 would be June (06) 2022 (22).
- Fit a tyre monitor system, which will inform you if a tyre is losing pressure.
 The unit from Safety Dave was recommended, but others are available.



Little Desert Weekend 30th September - 3rd October

Since 1989, I have led trips into one of my favourite areas - the Little Desert.

Over the years, a template for the trip has emerged:

- A couple of weeks beforehand, recce the area for possible trips and problems
- Over the weekend, have excursions into different areas of the desert and surrounding areas
- Arrange a Saturday evening meal at a local establishment
- Try to make some new discoveries
- Above all, have fun and make it an enjoyable experience

This year we resurrected the event after an hiatus of two years due to the Covid restrictions and I believe achieved all these goals.

In attendance were two vehicles from NSW, eight from SA and nine from Vic. Each of the clubs minuted the event as a Club trip, thus covering "legals".

Of note among the attendees was Sue and Simon Smith (SA), who joined us direct from Geraldton W.A.

Les Warburton surprised us by arriving unannounced. We were delighted to see him, but Nature not necessarily.

After setting up his camp. A swarm of bees arrived and settled in a tree above his tent, forcing him to move.

The Weekly Times reported the area had 25mm of rain three weeks before our weekend. Two weeks before

another 25mm and the week prior, a miserly 5mm.

Fortunately, the low rainfall and sun meant we could select sand entry into the desert for our trips, rather than using the black top.

The sun also meant that shorts needed to be purchased locally to improve our suntans.

The weekend began with the usual safety briefing covering Covid protocols, emergency procedures for fire and first aid and a reminder on convoy rules.

There were defibrillators in camp and we treated one bee sting and one bull ant bite over the weekend.

On Saturday three trips were offered and all were well attended.



The first trip had a World War II theme and included a visit to the Nhill airport and its display of the role it played in training aircrew during the war.

A drive into the Desert to view the ruins of the practice bombing range followed.

The second trip went into the Desert to Broughton's Waterhole and Mt Turner.

The third trip was again into the Desert to Moree Reserve, then on the Mt Moffat. A road closure curtailed part of that trip.

Saturday evening, thirty attendees filed into Bordertown's Woolshed Inn for dinner. A great get together with lots of chatter through the night.



On Sunday morning, a tour of the grand, historic Serviceton railway station was offered. Otherwise, it was a free day for people to do what they wanted.

Simon Smith led a group of South Australians into the Desert for some sand driving.

Harry and Jill went via Mundulla to have lunch at the Farmers Leap winery. They reported it was a great experience and suggested it could be considered as a trip for next year,

Not such a great experience though, was the nearby Orchid Walk. While they did find some nice orchids, Jill stepped on a bull ant nest and suffered a nasty bite, which later required a visit to the medical centre in Dimboola.

Others ventured into Bordertown to see the photo exhibition and Bob Hawke display at the Information Centre. Alas, they found it was closed.

Our NSW guests wanted a designated driver that evening to take them into Worsley to view the NRL Grand Final.

Of course, I volunteered.

I was pleasantly surprised to find the hotel had been upgraded and the meals were fantastic. Unfortunately, they can only cater for small numbers.

The boys were happy as their team, Penrith, won.

Orchid numbers were down due to the cool, wet weather and lack of sunshine. Those we saw and photographed were sun orchids (thelymitra spp), spider orchids (caladenia spp), greenhoods (pterostylis spp) and pink fingers (Caledonia earnen) among others.

On the previous Friday, Harry and Jill found lots of orchids and wildflowers at the Billy Ho Nature Walk. Glenda and Rick also found an abundance at Moree Reserve.

I heard that Bronze Wing Pigeons were prolific due to the Wallowa Wattle (acacia calimifolia) producing lots of seed over the last couple of years. The vivid yellow was photogenic.

On a trip to Mundulla, lan and I were shocked to witness a driver, sick of waiting at the red flashing lights at a level crossing, decide to go through the crossing. A fast moving train missed the foolish driver by a few seconds.

Thank you to all who attended. A special thank you to lan Blainey and Graeme Mitchell who helped with pre-tripping and leading trips over the weekend.

The Serviceton Recreation Reserve has been booked for next year. So note your diaries.

SA has promised a trip into the Big Desert and deep, big sand dunes on the Milmed Track.

They hope to see Victoria's answer to Ayers Rock (Uluru).

Little Desert Report South Australian Version

Traditionally, the Jackaroo Club of Victoria run a trip over the first weekend in October every year, to visit the Little Desert National Park and surrounding area.

The wildflowers at this time are usually at their best. Members of the NSW Jackaroo Club and the SA 4WD & Touring Club are always invited to come along too.

With Covid-19 travel restrictions removed at last, this trip was the first return to the Little Desert since 2019.

Thirty two people in seventeen vehicles took part in the weekend's activities.

The Serviceton Recreation Reserve,

located one and half kilometres south of Serviceton, was where we camped.

There are eight powered sites in the main area, with another two general power outlets accessible from the amenities block and water pump.

As it was a base camp, people could arrive and leave on the days that suited them. Some early birds arrived on the Thursday and a few late leavers stayed until Tuesday.

Four trips were on offer, namely:

- 1. Nhill Historic tour
- 2. Bordertown Highlights
- 3. Kaniva Silo Art
- 4. Mt Moffat area

There was also a tour of the Serviceton railway station on the Sunday.

Given the number of vehicles involved, people were rotated through the trips, allowing six vehicles in any one convoy.

It was all very free and easy, with individuals able to choose what they wanted to do and when.

This made a nice change from normal



tours, where you are on the road most days travelling on an itinerary.

Happy Hours were held around a campfire on all nights, except Saturday when we had a group dinner at the Woolshed Inn in Bordertown.



The sunsets were stunning, keeping some of us at the campfire well into the gloaming.

Weatherwise, there was no rain and the days just got better and better. The early days of overcast cloud improved to blue skies and plenty of sunshine.

The drives were pretty, with bright yellow canola crops interspersed with green wheat and darker green broad beans.

We were told, this area of Victoria grows the bulk of the broad beans grown in Australia.



It's been such a wet year, the wheat crop had to be crop dusted for rust. On Saturday, we were treated to a display of low flying by a crop duster in the fields around the campsite.

Roger Hall explained, GPS guidance enables crop dusting to be perfectly applied these days.

The wet, cold year also meant the wildflowers, especially the orchids, were not yet in abundance.

Our Victorian friends, who have been regular attendees on these weekends for thirty years, were able to point out:

Purple waxlip orchids
Fire orchids (or were they
Running Postman)
Greenhood orchids
Spider orchids
Donkey orchids


Fringe Myrtle was in abundance in most areas, while south of Mt Moffat, there was Pink Heath.

In terms of four wheel driving, the sand was generally firm, with some sections of the tracks holding water in mud holes.

Once we determined the ground was firm at the bottom of these holes, we started to drive straight through, albeit with a little caution. (Note: I am speaking for myself here)

Mt Moffat was a highlight. Its summit was a good lunch spot. It provided 360° views over the never ending mallee scrub and in the sun, was perfect.

The steep sand track off the top, down to the floor of the park, provided a bit of a challenge for drivers.



At the other end of the scale, height wise, was Broughton's Waterhole, located just off the

McDonald Highway.

This was a delightful camp area around a large waterhole, about the size of a football oval. Perfect for a break after we had climbed the nearby Mt Turner.

As previously stated, the program was free and easy.



On Sunday afternoon, after a visit to the Serviceton railway station, Alyson and I made our way to Nhill to visit the ex-RAAF base, which is only open on Sundays.



After a guided tour of the hangar and its three planes, many photographs and displays, we left and crossed the highway to find the target bombing range.

We completed a round trip with a drive through the Park and back roads to camp.

While we did our trip, others ventured back to Mt Moffat to play in the sand and mudholes.



The Recreation Reserve is no longer used for football, or cricket. However its facilities are available in the old pavilion for use by campers.

Although the showers and toilets are basic, they are well maintained and kept to a high standard by a shrinking band of local helpers.

While we were there, the toilets and showers were refreshed daily. A big thank you to these volunteers.

In summary, the weekend was a great little break. Everyone was in good spirits, with much friendliness within the whole group.

The weather was good to superb and the trips interesting and enjoyable.

Full marks to Alan Dash and the Jackaroo Club of Victoria for making all the arrangements and to everyone who participated so well.

There were large patches of Donkey



orchids, Running Postman and quite a few other flowers.

Back on the road, we headed south along Tallageira Track, then turned right into Elliots Track.



Here there were scattered patches of various flowers, so we stopped at the intersection with Mt Moffat Track to have a wander around.

On then to Mt Moffat and our lunch stop. Although only 135 metres high, it offers great 360° views.

This was a great spot to stop for lunch -





no wind, a great view and the sun was shining.

The descent on the east side was steep and sandy, but proved no problems.

Shortly after we turned on to Boundary Track. As we travelled along the track, kangaroos and emus darted across in front of us. Gayle called the ones from the left, while I watched out to my right. We had some close calls.

One emu misjudged its jump and hit the fence square on. There was lots of kicking and feathers flying, before it got free and fled to the safety of the thick scrub.
